Minimum admission requirements:


See <u>UCT Handbooks</u> and search for Engineering and Built Envrionment Postgraduate Handbook. The minimum requirements for entry into the Master of Urban Design Degree Programme are a **SAQA NQF Level 8 Certificate**, minimum Honours or Master level graduates in **Architecture**, **Landscape Architecture**, **or Planning** from any recognised institution approved by Senate, with a preferred min GPA 65%. Any application will be reviewed on portfolio submission/interview. MUD is a taught design degree and students are expected to be on-campus in Cape Town.

Application requirements:

The process of application is for entry to MUD is via <u>UCT online application</u> with Plan Code APG12; Programme Code EM030.

The online application will direct students to submit the following:

- Degree certificate and transcript: A digital copy of your latest university transcript and degree certificate(s). You will be requested to courier a certified copy of your original university results transcript. Please be sure to send this to the Admissions Office.
- 2. Curriculum vitae: this should include personal details, interests, travel or work experience and all degree information at an international level (and status of degree).
- 3. Letter of motivation: submit a statement in your own words (approximately 750 words) of why you are attracted to the urban design field at UCT, and what you hope to do with your qualification. This letter, with the portfolio, provides an important opportunity for you to give the assessment panel an understanding of who you are. It is advisable to undertake some research on urban design about the profession and to reflect on this in your letter of motivation.
- 4. A portfolio of design and creative work: Portfolio requirements are less than 20Mb in size and in PDF no page limit, but be strategetic and clear about your role on the project. The key elements are to show a design ability / competency, and you are encouraged to show design process, development and thinking behind your creative work; your personal approach to design / urban context, including your inspiration (in photography, art, design, sketch book etc). It is necessary to include your responsibility of design projects and/or design role within projects in the portfolio, dates or timeframes worked on the project and potential outcomes / lessons. It will be important to show hand-drawn and digital (GIS, Illustrator, AutoCAD, sketch-up etc.) drawings and an approach to 3-dimensional modelling and 3-dimensional spatial thinking. You can include your own academic writing that has been evaluated at your previous institution of study/ relevant research work or material that clearly illustrates your approach/interest (please do not send the whole thesis, but a selection of strategic writing that is relevant). This portfolio will be assessed by a Selection Committee.
- 5. SAQA Certificate for international students, showing minimum NQF level 8 for entry.



For non-design related applications:

Please take note that applicants holding non-design, but related Bachelor (Honours) degrees (NQF Level 8), will be required to undertake a **design related degree** in APG e.g. Honours in Landscape Architecture (BLA) or Planning (BCP) or Architecture (BAS) with preferred exit degree minimum 65% GPA/interview.

The Bridging Courses offered in APG are seen as additional design courses for students entering MUD, but are no longer an option for entry to MUD with no NQF level 8 design degree background.

FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS:

The deadline for international applicants is 31 August 2026.

In addition to the above, if students have not attended a South African University prior to application, you must supply a <u>SAQA NQF Level Confirmation Certificate</u> to validate your previous degree / university is a minimum NQF Level 8. You must include this certificate in your portfolio package.

Successful international applicants are strongly advised to apply for a study visa immediately after receiving an offer to avoid delays. International students must factor visa processing times (minimum 6 – 8 weeks) as well as International Student Clearance with the IAPO, within timelines for registration. International applicants are therefore strongly advised to submit completed applications well before 31 August to ensure registration for the following year. 




FOR PROGRAMME STRUCTURE:

1 Full Time or 2 year Extended Programme:

The focus in the first semester is an integrated Urban Design Studio with Landscape Architecture and City Planning courses. Urban Design Representation is also conducted in the first semester. Urban Design Research Methods takes place in Semester 1 in order to guide the overarching Urban Design Research Project within Semester 2. Urban Design Theory I explores notions of theory and place-making in the global south, touching on historical references. Urban Design Theory II focuses on African cities. Each student must study an elective course.

SEMESTER 1: Representation matters

COURSE OUTLINE: 12 credits, Level NQF 8

Urban Design Representation is conducted in the first semester. The course aims to develop analytical and presentation skills for use in the urban design studio by exploring detailed representation of the studio project. The objectives are:

- To learn representation of the city through sketching, drawing / mapping using digital tools, including GIS and Adobe (or similar) programmes and other tools of representation, including film, photography and 3-dimensional model building (digital and real).
- To illustrate how urban design demonstrates transformation of the built environment across different scales from metro to neighbourhood to street.

UD Theory I **ACD**

SEMESTER 1: Re-thinking City Design

COURSE OUTLINE: 12 credits, Level NQF 8/9

URBAN DESIGN THEORY / ASPECTS OF CITY DESIGN is conducted in the first semester. The course is about reviewing the typology of cities and urban design through theory and case studies. It aims to investigate the value of city design through considering performance at a local neighbourhood area / precinct scale. A case study located within the Western Cape is used as part of the workshop series co-design process.

APG 5085S:

UD Theory II

SEMESTER 2: Urban Design Africa

COURSE OUTLINE: 20 credits, NQF 9

Urban Design Theory II is conducted in the 2nd Semester. This course relates to critical readings ad discussion focused on urban theory in the local African context and the intersection between urban design and the social agenda. Debates are intended to revolve around themes of the everyday African city: informality, public space, governance and partnerships, inequity and marginalisation and participatory processes.

UD Studio (PARTS A&B)

SEMESTER 1: Resilient STUDIO - A

COURSE OUTLINE: 48 credits (A&B), Level NQF 9

Urban Design Studio is conducted in Semester 1. The studio is deeply grounded in the lived experience and everyday reality, giving an evidence-based understanding of how cities work and can be transformed over time. The urban studio focuses the relationship between spatial systems and the social, cultural and political context. Community representatives are part of the engaged action learning process that allows for the work to be solution-based and action-orientated. Knowledge is co-produced through iterative and deliberate learning activities, such as urban walks + social & emotional mapping and urban talks + co-design workshops.

Urban Design Studio PART A (40%) is conducted in the first term and focuses on contextual analysis and the development of design principles.

SEMESTER 1: Urban Design Research Methods (UDRM)

COURSE OUTLINE: 20 credits. NQF 9

The course aims to equip students with the knowledge and skills to develop a research proposal (end of Semester 1) for the Urban Design Research Project (UDRP) (Semester 2). This research proposal should include:

- A clear statement of the research questions, aims, rationale, including context, background information that will guide the UDRP - upfront engagement and research will be important prior to the mid-term break;
- An overview of literature and the theoretical framework for the UDRP;
- Methodologies to be used for the UDRP;
- Explanation and connection to relevance of the topic relative to urban design;
- A draft bibliography;
- A clear timetable for your research;
- Completion of the required UCT ethics forms.


SEMESTER 1: Resilient STUDIO - B

COURSE OUTLINE: same as Term 1

Urban Design Studio PART B (60%) continues from the contextual analysis in Term 1 and is conducted in the second term. It focuses on concept and design development, and the creation of an urban design framework, precinct designs and the understanding of 3-dimensional urban design guidelines.

SEMSETER 2: Urban Design Research Project // (UDRP)

COURSE OUTLINE: 60 Credits, NQF 9

Urban Design Research Project (mini dissertation) is conducted in Semester 2 and follow on from UDRM. The aim of the research project is to develop and demonstrate integrated research and urban design skills; identify and address a well-defined urban design issue or question in the context of a site; develop an ability to analyse design orientated research findings according to explicit criteria; and to present and support an urban design response to the issue/question raised through appropriate methods of Urban Design inquiry and representation.

The Research Project must be academically rigorous and make a strategic contribution to the discipline of urban design locally and in South Africa / internationally.
